

Year 6 have been very creative this week, writing non-chronological reports about fictional creatures. Inspired by Shaun Tan's book, The Lost Thing, the children have imagined themselves as experts on these creatures and have composed 'field-guide' descriptions of them. This has linked also to our learning in science where we have learned about Antarctica and how creatures such as the Emperor Penguin are adapted to survive in such a hostile climate.

Threadworm in children and school

Threadworms are a common type of worm infection in the UK, particularly in children under the age of 10.

When to see your GP

If you think you or your child may have threadworms, you can usually treat the infection yourself with medication available at pharmacies without a prescription.

You only need to see your GP if you think you have threadworms and you're pregnant or breastfeeding, or if you think your child has threadworms and they're under two years old. In these circumstances, the recommended treatment is usually different.

Treating threadworms

If you or your child has threadworms, everyone in your household will need to be treated as there's a high risk of the infection spreading. This includes those who don't have any symptoms of an infection.

For most people, treatment will involve taking a single dose of a medication called mebendazole to kill the worms. If necessary, another dose can be taken after two weeks.

During treatment and for a few weeks afterwards, it's also important to follow strict hygiene measures to avoid spreading the threadworm eggs. This includes regularly vacuuming your house and thoroughly washing your bathroom and kitchen.

If you're pregnant or breastfeeding, hygiene measures are usually recommended without medication. This is also often the case for young children.

Preventing threadworms

It's not always possible to prevent a threadworm infection, but you can significantly reduce your risk by always maintaining good hygiene and encouraging children to do the same.

Children should wash their hands regularly, particularly after going to the toilet and before mealtimes. Kitchen and bathroom surfaces should be kept clean.

If your child is infected, encouraging them not to scratch the affected area around their anus or vagina, will help prevent reinfection and reduce the risk of the infection spreading to others.

Do children with threadworm need to be kept off school?

It is not necessary to exclude children with threadworm from school.

The recommendation not to exclude children from school is based on advice from the Health Protection Agency [HPA, 2003]. Exclusion is not required because [DynaMed, 2006]: The risk of transmission in schools is relatively low (less than 10%).

Strict personal hygiene is the most effective way to help prevent the spread and re occurrence as there is a 75% risk of the spread of Threadworm within families [NICE – National Institute for Clinical Excellence].

Cross-Country Success

On Tuesday, our cross-country team took part in a competition with the other MoD schools on island. The event was very successful for Akrotiri School, with both the Y3/4 and Y5/6 teams triumphing in their respective events. All of our children ran very well, reflecting the hard-work they had all put in to training for the event.

Individually, Jack Battersby won the Y3/4 competition; Georgie Branton came 2^{nd} and was the first girl to finish; Angus Blackburn came back 3^{rd} ; and Kyra Leirer was the 2^{nd} girl to finish.

In the Y5/6 race, Tyler Wickham finished 2nd and Millie Cooper won the medal for the 1st place girl.
