

Important Safety Notice – Car Park

To improve safety for pedestrians accessing school through the main gate, there have recently been changes made to the Shoppers' Car Park opposite Flamingo Walk and to the front of the Main School building.

A path has been created to run from the Pelican Crossing to the main school gate and, as a result the parking bays which were to the left of the car park have been removed; the lines erased and replaced by double yellow lines to prevent parking.

Please observe these new restrictions, as it is impossible to safely navigate the remainder of the car park when cars are parked illegally and this may result in injury to pedestrians or damage to other vehicles.

Nuts in School Akrotiri School is a Nut Free School

This year we have several pupils with us, who have allergies to nuts and nut products, such as but not limited to; Peanuts (including and specifically Peanut Butter) and Nutella (or other brands of chocolate hazelnut spread).

Ingestion and contact with the products — even contact with someone who has consumed nuts could be enough to trigger anaphylactic shock — a life-threatening condition.

Please therefore avoid sending nuts in any form and nut products, where known, into school under any circumstances.

We have continued this learning in our classrooms by sharing the story 'Dear Zoo', writing our own versions, making animal enclosures and even looking after a terrapin and guinea pigs brought in by Austin in Bat class.








Year 1 kick started their dinosaur topic with a dinosaur dig! They became palaeontologists and uncovered different bones. After close inspection, we talked about which part of the dinosaur the bone might be from and why and even what the dinosaur's diet might be! We then looked at fossils and where they came from, before creating our own fossils. On Friday we had a visit from an archaeologist, who told us how she found out about the past. We had a look at her tools and had a go at using them.

Mr Winslade from Turtle Watch came to school and taught **Year 2** about the different turtles in Cyprus, their life cycles and how we can help them survive. Then we went on a trip to the beach and Mr Winslade showed us what a turtle nest looks like! We also collected some beach treasures and made some art work with the things we found. We had lots of fun and it was a great way to launch our Beachcombers topic!









As part of our topic 'Predator,' **Year 3** pupils have started to read 'Krindlekrax' by Philip Ridley. We have met the main characters and are exploring what it means to be a hero. We have sketched the main character, Ruskin. No one thinks he looks like a hero, but he believes that he was born to be a hero. We launched our topic by exploring predators and food chains. In art we painted some amazing lions, we had to work hard to mix shades and tones. We think you will agree that our lions are very majestic.



Year 4 had a fully charged end of term when they were visited by RAF engineers as part of science week. The children built their own circuits and went on to attach lights and a motor to a model plane.









Year 5 really enjoyed our science week activities where we undertook a wide range of practical science investigations. Our favourite was making our own ice cream! We used ice, salt, cream, sugar, vanilla extract and plastic freezer bags. The salt lowered the temperature of the ice further which meant we were able to make ice cream without the use of a freezer or an ice cream maker! This was an irreversible change.





Year 6 are working very hard to prepare for the forthcoming SATs tests in May. It is a challenging time for the children, but the calmness, maturity and effort they have shown over the last couple of weeks has impressed us greatly.

The children did have a break from SATs and visited St. John's School where they took part in a Greek Easter Celebrations with children from Episkopi School and St. John's School. They all took part in a series of activities including Greek Dancing, egg painting and bashing, and tasting Easter foods.

AFF offers confidential advice and support for RAF families stationed on Cyprus

As an RAF family, you may not normally consider the Army Families Federation (AFF) as your first port of call for information and advice. However, for those of you stationed on the island of Cyprus, the situation is slightly different.

What is AFF?

AFF is the independent voice of all Army families worldwide: Regular or Reserve, whether or not they have children, wherever and however they live.

As the RAF Families Federation does not have a Co-ordinator based in Cyprus, AFF has agreed that, where appropriate, they will help RAF families with any concerns or questions you may have.

Where can I find them?

Their WSBA Co-ordinator, Carolyn Aggar, covers both Akrotiri and Episkopi. She can be found in the HIVE at RAF Akrotiri on Monday mornings between 10am and midday, and also attends various briefings and forums, where she raises the concerns of RAF families and pushes for improvements to be made.

What can AFF help with?

There are several issues that can affect families assigned to Cyprus, regardless of which Service they work for.

Employment for family members is an issue that is consistently raised by both Army and RAF families across all British Forces Cyprus (BFC) bases.

Childcare is another topic that is often raised by both Army and RAF families. Childminders are few and far between in Cyprus, so whilst several of the BFC bases have incredible new early years facilities, a lot of families stationed there would like longer opening hours, enabling more spouses to access employment opportunities. As AFF's Co-ordinators work closely with the welfare teams, they are in a position to be able to voice your concerns and try to influence accordingly.

Other issues that AFF can help RAF families stationed in Cyprus with include housing, visa and citizenship questions and other enquiries from our Foreign & Commonwealth families, health and other additional needs.

All of the enquiries that AFF receives can be recorded anonymously. AFF collects information from its Co-ordinators across the globe, identifies key trends, investigates them further and then uses this evidence to lobby the chain of command or other relevant agencies. This often results in a change of policy helps to improve families' lives.
